Workshop Title: Just Because It Is Not Wrong Doesn't Make It Right: Teaching Children to Think and Act Ethically

*This is a scheduled hybrid session for virtual and in-person attendees

Description: Barbara Coloroso offers a comprehensive workshop that provides practical advice on using everyday life experiences to teach children values such as integrity, civility, and compassion. Workshop Title: Breaking Barriers: Incarcerated Fathers' Journey to Sustain Parental Engagement *This is a scheduled hybrid session for virtual and in-person attendees

Description: This workshop delves into the findings of a qualitative study that involved interviewing twenty-four fathers who had been incarcerated in the past and had received services from a fatherhood program in Long Island, New York. The fathers discussed their experiences and challenges in maintaining relationships with their children during their incarceration. The obstacles they faced in engaging with their children were categorized into three types: structural (such as prison rules, lack of freedom, and visitation restrictions), relational (such as conflicts with their children's mother(s) or other family members), and personal (such as feelings of shame, embarrassment, or the reluctance to expose their children to their circumstances). The workshop focuses on amplifying the fathers' voices and concerns while also providing specific interventions that fatherhood programs can implement to overcome these barriers and ensure that all fathers and children can build sustainable and meaningful relationships, regardless of their incarceration status.

Workshop Title: Preventing and Healing Estranged Family Relationships: Supporting Fathers in Meaningful Ways

*This is a scheduled hybrid session for virtual and in-person attendees

Description: It has become a growing problem in Western communities, such as Canada and the United States, that parents and their adult children (as well as their grandchildren) lose contact with each other. This trend is partially due to the transformation of families due to union breakdowns. For example, in Canada, 1 in 5 children will have minimal to no contact with their fathers two years after the divorce. This rate increases to 4 in 10 children by the 10th year. The program uses interactive activities to help individuals: (1) Understand the factors that contribute to the loss of family contact. (2) Discuss how estrangement affects fathers in particular. (3) Offer useful tips and strategies for supporting estranged fathers and their families. The presenters will also discuss cultural practices and strategies, especially for "collectivistic" cultures that tend to be closed systems. It is crucial to work collectively and find meaningful ways to help and advocate for fathers experiencing estrangement, whether short-term or long-term. This workshop is geared for all interested parties!

Workshop Title: Dads Club Edinburgh Lone Fathers Project

*This is a scheduled hybrid session for virtual and in-person attendees

Description: The idea for the Dads Club originated from observing fathers having fun with their young children at a holiday center swimming pool. Instead of relying on center-based group sessions for parenting support, we developed a program of sports, outdoor activities, and visits where fathers could participate with their children. Parenting support is an additional component provided by the project worker and other families involved in the activities.

The project aimed to engage single fathers with young children, including the primary caregivers and those who contact fathers with shorter durations of care. All fathers were encouraged to give their children the time and space to express themselves and for their opinions to be recognized. In light of this, the group decided that the children should determine the location, time, travel, and financing of Saturday trips, provided that it was feasible. As a result, the children became more expressive, talkative, and self-assured. They feel they are an important part of the project and rely on the Saturday routine, as confirmed by many fathers.

The project is the only one in the United Kingdom that caters to lone and contact fathers. The project follows an activity-based approach to supporting fathers, which facilitates interaction between fathers and their children and between fathers and project workers.

Workshop Title: Family Treatment Courts: Engaging the Whole Family Inclusive of Fathers!

Description: Fathers play a crucial role in promoting their children's well-being. Research shows that children with involved fathers have a solid foundation and are less likely to experience negative outcomes such as poor school performance, criminal activity, substance use, and infant mortality. Despite this, fathers continue to be underrepresented in the services provided to parents involved in the child welfare system. This is due to distinct reasons, including mothers being more likely to be named as the respondent parent, social stigma, family member "gatekeeping," and rigid treatment and drug testing schedules.

Collaborative teams that include professionals from child welfare, substance use disorder treatment, the court system, and other partners have developed innovative strategies to address the unique challenges faced by fathers and to improve father engagement. In this workshop, attendees will learn about the importance of father involvement, discuss the obstacles fathers face, and hear lessons from practitioners who have improved their work with families, including fathers. Attendees will leave with practical strategies to improve father engagement in meaningful services, expand the family support systems for children involved in the child welfare system, and enhance family outcomes.

Workshop Title: From Men to Fathers to Families – Building Wholistic Capacity

Workshop Title: Transforming Urban & Tribal Fatherless Men Through Values-Based Instruction

Description: Recent research suggests that single fathers may be more effective solo parents than single mothers. As a result, government agencies and family foundations are allocating funding towards programs that focus on training and developing urban and underserved fathers. Participants can learn and replicate the efforts of Core 300 International's values-based, servant-leadership curriculum in



Kenya and Uganda for over 11 years. It has successfully graduated over 37,000 mostly poor men, including ministers, male inmates and ex-cons, and lower-level, male uniformed officers. The program's impact has been measured using Likert Scale Rater Surveys over the last five years. Wives, of course graduates, were asked to compare their husbands' behavioral changes before and after the training. The results showed an average of 94% "Better+ Much Better" scores overall. From 2019-2023, 579 wives will be surveyed to measure the impact of values-based leadership on poor men who grew up fatherless and were toxic actors upon their wives and children. The goal is to empower leading men in tribal communities to become change agents and lead a cultural revolution with constructive, humane, and compassionate core values in their community.

Workshop Title: The African-American Infant & Maternal Mortality Fatherhood Engagement

Description: The African-American Infant and Maternal Mortality Prevention Initiative of Los Angeles established their Fatherhood Program to close the birthing disparity gaps further. In this session, we will share strategies from our countywide coalition dedicated to addressing the disproportionately high rates of Black infant and maternal deaths prevention by including fathers in both prevention and intervention services and led by the County of Los Angeles Department of Public Health (DPH) in partnership with First 5 LA, AAIMM. By this approach, we address how to mitigate factors where Black mothers are four times more likely to die from pregnancy complications than their white counterparts, while Black infants are three times more likely to die within their first year of life when compared to white babies. Through a series of comprehensive, coordinated strategies, AAIMM's goal is to reduce the gap in Black/white infant mortality rates by 30 percent by 2023.
